Reading Passage 1

About 20,000 years ago, the last Ice Age was at its height. Outside the tropics, temperatures were as much as 15 degrees lower than today, and vast ice-sheets covered almost one-quarter of the earth's present land surface. In the northern hemisphere, they reached as far south as Chicago and London.

5 These severe conditions persisted for several thousand years, but at length the ice-sheets began to retreat as average temperatures slowly rose. As the ice-sheets and glaciers melted, the sea rose again, and by 5000 B.C. had reached almost its present height. In the process, large areas of formerly dry land were drowned, but the milder temperatures more than compensated for this, in human terms, by encouraging an increasing abundance of plant and animal food. Forests, with
10 their accompanying wildlife, recolonized much of the former arctic wastes while grasslands, likewise teeming with game, replaced the deserts around the equator. For mankind this was a period of new possibilities, and in several parts of the world human societies grasped these opportunities by developing a completely new ways of life, based on farming.

This had two aspects. On the one hand there was agriculture—the deliberate alternation of
15 natural systems in order to produce an abundance of a particular variety of plants. On the other came the domestication of useful animal species to provide milk, meat, hides, or wool, and a vital source of power for plowing and other agricultural processes. Thus, full-scale agriculture developed and many of the species domesticated by the early farmers have remained the mainstay of agricultural economies to this day—such as wheat and barley, rice and millet, corn, beans, and the
20 potato.

These changes were revolutionary, for they marked the development of a completely new way of life. The immense impact of agriculture, vastly increasing the number of people who could be fed and clothed, and in the process transforming the face of the earth, makes it one of the most important developments in the history of mankind.

5 The art or science of alchemy is of great antiquity, for it has been practiced for over two thousand years. It also has a long history, for there are still alchemists to be found in continents as far apart as America, Europe, and Asia. Its heyday was from about 800 A.D. to the middle of the seventeenth century, and its practitioners ranged from kings, popes, and emperors to minor clergy, merchants, doctors, and clerks.

10 Alchemy is of a twofold nature, outward or exoteric, and hidden or esoteric. Exoteric alchemy is concerned with attempts to prepare a substance, the philosophers' stone, or simply the Stone, endowed with the power of transmuting the base metals lead, tin, copper, iron, and mercury into the precious metals gold and silver. The Stone was credited not only with the power of transmutation but with being able to prolong human life indefinitely. In esoteric alchemy, the transmutation of metals became symbolic of the transformation of men into perfect beings.

The two kinds of alchemy became inextricably mixed with the search for the Stone and mystical beliefs intertwined.

15 It has to be remembered that the practical alchemists were well aware that if they succeeded in making gold artificially, their lives might be in great danger from avaricious people.

20 Even the suspicion that they had discovered the secret was often sufficient to endanger them. One alchemist complained that falling under suspicion, he had to disguise himself, shave off his beard, and put on a wig before he was able to escape, under a false name. He added that he knew of people who had been found strangled in their beds simply because they were thought to have found the Stone, though in reality they knew no more about it than their murderers.
